FUELS REDUCTION TOUR JULY 17

ave you seen the thinning of trees on the Town of Waterville property going up McGinnis Canyon? This fuels reduction project will be highlighted on a tour, July 17, beginning at 9:00 a.m. and over by noon. Mike Lesky, one of South Douglas CD supervisors and former forester, will lead the tour. We will also go look at a fuels reduction project on Redfield Road. Mike will discuss forest health, and what landowners can do to improve their property. Jill Thompson, Waterville Mayor, will talk about the Waterville project as well. We will meet at the Badger Mountain Ski Hill parking lot, at the bottom of



McGuiness Canyon—where Baseline Road turns south up McGinnis (Badger Mountain Road). See you there!

Our chipping days, May 18 and 19, helped 23 landowners with fuels reduction on their property. Both urban and rural residents participated. We did pass by three piles that looked like the "not this" pile on our website. We will provide this service again in November, so watch this newsletter for more information.

Was it because the sale was cancelled last year? Was everyone at home during the pandemic looking in their yards and gardens and thinking some new plants would be good? New and returning customers came out to the fairgrounds and hauled lots of plants home. We had impulse tables filled with pollinator plants and other shrubs and trees.



The volunteers—Kay, Carolyn, Jo, Jeff, Bryan, Lindsey, and Pat—made it easy to get the orders ready on Friday and help buyers decide what to add to their orders on Saturday. The sale is held first Saturday in April each year, with catalogs ready first part of March. Thank you for your support.



How do you attract pollinators?

- 1. Plant a variety of plants. Different pollinators respond to different colors.
- 2. Add water. A small bowl of water in the garden.
- 3. Provide shelter. Mulch. Or even dry open soil for solitary bumblebees.
- 4. Concentrate on adding native plants, but other non natives also attract. (Non native are native somewhere.)
- 5. Try adding some trees. Maples and willows are good choices.
- 6. Let your herbs bloom. The flowers attract pollinators
- 7. Limit your use of pesticides.

8. Recognize that pollinators include bumblebees, honey bees,

flies, bats and more. More than 1,000 of all pollinators are vertebrates, and 200,000 species are beneficial insects.



Native Penstemons are beautiful and attract bees and butterflies.

You can start small and still make a difference to pollinators.

BE PREPARED IN CASE OF WILDFIRE

Fire season is upon us. The time to prepare is now. Clean your roof and gutters of dead leaves, debris and pine needles that could catch embers. Move any flammable material away from the exterior of the house—firewood piles, mulch, leaves and needles—anything that could catch fire. Plan your escape route in case of a fire. Have you planned for the safety of your pets and outside animals? Can the firetrucks find you easily and have safe access to your properly?



WHAT IT'S LIKE TO BE A BIRD



This new book, written by David Allen Sibley, is about birds flying, nesting, eating, singing and everything in between. The excellent drawings and descriptions will encourage you to go outside and watch the birds. Most of them are familiar birds you see in North Central Washington.

This is not a field guide. The large 8.5 x 11" book is over 200 pages. But once you know which bird you see you can probably read about it. Did you know that almost every feather on a bird is different? A small sparrow has about 1800 feathers in the summer. Robins actually benefit from invasive berries and global warming because more food is available. Scientific facts about the birds

and why they do what they do in an easy to read format make this book a delight. It is available through your library. (I might have to buy this one for my personal library.)

Jeff Rock, a supervisor for twenty years, had decided early this year not to continue as a supervisor. Jeff's commitment to natural resource conservation will not end with the end of his position.
